Gospel Reflection

As a young person, there is nothing better than being in love! Sure, loving your family and being loved by them is pretty important, but to 'fall in love' with someone and have that love returned is something quite extraordinary. Love sets us on fire! To be loved by someone else makes all the tough times endurable; it makes us believe in ourselves because someone else sees something worthwhile within us. It's exciting and it's incredibly life-giving!

This is something of the message that Jesus is trying to convey to his disciples in this week's gospel. He is trying to share with them some understanding of the incredible joy he experiences through his relationship with the Father. And just as he is loved by the Father, so Jesus loves his disciples and so are they invited to share in the love of the Father. Jesus' whole mission and ministry was to share with people the love of God that he knew so intimately. His actions towards the 'lesser ones' of the world was to demonstrate to them that they are not only worthy of love but were already loved. Jesus tells his disciples that all they have to do to constantly remain in his love is to keep his commandments and then he clarifies for them that his only commandment to them is to love one another as Jesus loved. To live in the love of Jesus and know the love of the Father, all we have to do is love one another. It seems simple.

The challenge is that we are to love all people – even those who make our lives difficult and unpleasant. As we are told in the Gospels of Luke and Matthew, 'If you love only those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them!' (Lk 6:32; Mt 5:46)

ANZAC DAY REFLECTION 2024

Anzac Day is a day of Remembrance and on this day I would like to reflect on some of the Symbols that help us to remember the

contribution of those who served and are still serving for New Zealand and Australia in different wars and conflicts.

THE FLAG

The NZ flag reminds us that this is truly a National Day of Prayer for peace when we pray for all those who died or were injured in wars.

THE POPPIES

I had no idea before I first went to France why poppies were so symbolic until I saw – as many of you who have been to France have seen-fields everywhere of red poppies like blood spatters on the green fields- which in some cases still cover the unknown soldiers buried underneath. The famous poem, In Flanders Field became

the symbol of the sacrifices of the soldiers. Composed by Lieutenant John McCrae after the death of his friend killed by a shell in Ypres.

In Flanders field the poppies grow Between the crosses row on row That mark our place, and in the sky The larks still bravely singing fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

The French also have their flower of remembrance which is the Blue Cornflower as these flowers continued to grow in the trenches in the middle of the battles.

THE BASKET OF ROSEMARY

The herb which is a symbol of Remembrance not just for then but which is used at many Funerals today.

THE WHITE CROSSES

Like the poppies, fields of white crosses cover the many battlefields in Europe and the Gallipoli Peninsular. In the Somme area at Thiepval from the Great War - the war to end all wars- there is the largest

Commonwealth War Memorial in the world with over 72,205 names of missing soldiers engraved on the stone pillars. The crosses on the graves of 300 soldiers lie in front of it.

In the American Cemetery above the WW11 Battle of Omaha Beach there are hundreds of white crosses symbolising the soldiers from the US who died on the beach below.

And we see white crosses in our own NZ Cemetery in Caterpillar Valley in Longeval where 125 New Zealanders are buried and where a panel displays the names of the 1200 whose bodies were never found. It was from this Cemetery that the Symbol of a Soldier standing for all the Unknowns - our Unknown Warrior -was chosen and his remains exhumed and brought home to be laid to rest in Wellington NZ in 2004.

He was brought home by the then Chief of the NZ Defence Force Bruce Fergusson, accompanied by NZ soldiers and the then NZDF Chaplain Fr Julian Wagg. I would like to read an excerpt of what Bruce Fergusson said when the body was placed in the coffin to bring home.

Soldier, I am Air Marshal Bruce Fergusson chief of the New Zealand Defence Force. You have served your Country with honour and have paid the supreme price. No one should ask more of you than that. But I have one more order for you. I have been charged with returning you to NZ. This is a direct order from me to

You are to leave your comrades -in- arms here in France with whom you have been resting and return with me to NZ as our Unknown Warrior. You will represent all those

New Zealanders who have given their lives in the cause of Freedom, including your 18,000 fallen comrades from your War. While you will leave your friends here in France, I assure you, you will never be alone. In return for this duty from you, I give you a Nation's commitment that you will be honoured and remembered forever. Through you a Nation will mourn and commemorate its sacrifice in times of War.

As a human aside to this, the Senior NCO came to Fergusson afterwards and said the accompanying soldiers had given the warrior a nickname which is a tradition that shows he was now one of them. The soldiers nicknamed him Bob and throughout the long journey home he was never left alone. This Warrior Bob symbolised the collective spirit of all those who had sacrificed their lives, transcending individual names and backgrounds.

So as we hear and see the symbolism of the Cross- for the deaths of soldiers who sacrificed their lives - we can link it to the Christian symbol of the Cross or the Crucifix. Jesus, in the prime of life dying on the Cross as the symbol of our Christian faith, the declaration of the depth of the love of Jesus for the good of humanity.

On this Anzac Day we honour the deaths of those who have made the ultimate acts of sacrifice for their Nation and for the good of others.

These symbols remind us that there are many in our Armed Forces who are in various parts of the world today still defending the values and freedoms in a world that has forgotten the mantra of WW1- the War that was meant to end all wars!


