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PENTECOST SUNDAY

Friends, Happy birthday!!!

Today we celebrate the great feast of Pentecost, the birthday of the Church. The Holy Spirit, the love shared by the Father and the Son, comes down upon the Church at Pentecost.

Fifty days after the resurrection, the early disciples were gathered together, and the Holy Spirit was poured out on them. What happened to them that day changed their lives, and it changed the world because it gave them strength.

There were three miraculous physical signs present that first Pentecost day, the mighty rushing wind, the tongues of fire and the miracle of speaking in tongues in other languages. Each of these tells us something about God. The wind tells us that God is life and the source of all life, both physical and spiritual. The fire

tells us that God has a heart burning with love. When the people from different nations suddenly understood each other in their own languages, it brought about peace and unity rather than division and disunity. It tells us that God desires understanding, reconciliation and peace for us.

Confirmation is our day of Pentecost where the work of the Holy Spirit is completed. The work of baptism is completed in our lives, and we receive courage and power to be authentic witnesses of Christ.

Before he departed, Jesus told his disciples it would be better for them that he goes back to heaven and send the Holy Spirit to them. He says since this since God is love. The aim of love is intimacy, and the Holy Spirit gives us maximum intimacy with God and God with us.

Pentecost Sunday in the Catholic Church is originally a Jewish Pentecost. Also known as Shavuot, it is a Jewish feast held fifty days after Passover, commemorating the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and the covenant between God and the Israelites.

During the Jewish feast of Pentecost, 50 days after Passover and the resurrection of Christ, the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles in the form of tongues of fire, enabling them to speak in different languages and empowering them to proclaim the Good News boldly.

This event marks the birth of the Church, as the Apostles, filled with the Holy Spirit, began to preach the Gospel to people from all nations who were gathered in Jerusalem and consequently spread Christianity throughout the world. Through the gift of tongues, the language barrier was overcome, and the message of salvation was able to reach a diverse audience. This supernatural event also signifies the fulfilment of Jesus' promise to send the Holy Spirit to guide and empower the Church (John 14:26).

Hence, the descent of the Holy Spirit reminds us of the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church, providing gifts and charisms to believers to build up the Body of Christ and to carry out the mission of evangelization. It also serves as a reminder that the Church is not merely a human institution, but a divine reality infused with the presence of the Holy Spirit, leading us to deepen our faith, grow in holiness, and bear witness to Christ in the world.

it is a time for us to celebrate the presence and work of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church and to reflect on how we too can be open to the Spirit's guidance and inspiration in our own lives.

Gospel Reflection The feast of Pentecost celebrates the power of the Holy Spirit coming upon the disciples and energising them to set about their mission of continuing the ministry of Jesus. The gospel reading is one of the post-resurrection appearances by Jesus when he breathed the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. The actual events of that first Pentecost are recorded in the book of Acts and are recalled in this week's first reading. The use of this post-resurrection gospel account is a reminder that Jesus had already imbued the disciples with the Spirit but, as so often throughout his ministry, they were a bit slow to catch on to the significance of what he had done. It seems that they needed a more tangible experience to jolt them into action and Acts records the very physical experience of the Spirit entering their midst as a roaring wind before settling upon them as tongues of flame. Jesus had breathed the Spirit upon them but it took the roaring wind to make a real impression on the disciples. There are frequent references in the gospels to Jesus being 'filled with the Spirit'. It is this Spirit with which he was filled that he breathed upon his disciples; it is that same Spirit that we receive sacramentally in Confirmation.

For the weeks following the death of Jesus the disciples had lived in fear and confusion, not fully understanding what had happened and not really knowing what to do. When they realised that the Spirit Jesus had breathed upon them was really present and urging them to action they finally had the courage to begin the mission that Jesus had entrusted to them: to spread the Good News of Jesus and continue to realise his message in the world. © LiturgyHelp

DAY 1 – 13th MAY: WELCOME TO PRIVACY WEEK 2023 (13th – 17TH MAY Debunked: Information Privacy Principle 11 of the Privacy Act 2020 states 2024) Introduction

The Office of the Privacy Commissioner (OPC) marks Privacy Week each year to promote privacy awareness, inform people of their rights under the Privacy Act, and help educate agencies about their responsibilities. It is held in conjunction with Privacy Awareness Week, an initiative by the Asia Pacific Privacy Authorities (APPA) network and celebrated worldwide.

The right to privacy is also guaranteed under Canon Law (Canon 220). The Catholic Church is vested in its commitment to protect the privacy rights of the Christian Faithful and the education and promotion of responsible and good privacy practices. As part of this commitment, we will journey together over the week in exploring areas where we can exercise care for privacy. OPC's theme for Privacy Week 2024 is "Busting Privacy Myths". As they say, busting one Myth a day, keeps the privacy breach bugs away.

MYTH OF THE DAY: WE ARE TOO SMALL TO WORRY ABOUT PRIVACY. We often hear common perceptions like:

- We are a church, we don't need to worry about privacy, plus it's an inconvenience, hard and it generates unnecessary work, or
- Our parish is too small to worry about privacy, we don't have any information people would be interested or want anyway.

Debunked: Privacy is a human right, for the Church it is deeply rooted in **Debunked:** Just because one wants the information, does not equate to one the fundamental dignity of the human person – for we are created in the image and likeness of God, and thus affects every single person. (Canon 220) Civilly, the Privacy Act 2020 is applicable to every organisation and persons in New Zealand. We collect and use personal information in the course of our daily work and as staff functioning within the Catholic Church in Aotearoa New Zealand, we must ensure we are careful and protect any personal information in our care.

DAY 2 – 14th MAY: theme for Privacy Week 2024 is "Busting Privacy Myths".

MYTH OF THE DAY:

Privacy is not my job. / It is the Privacy Officer's job not mine. Debunked: As we understand from yesterday's Myth busted, this is incorrect. Protecting privacy should be everyone's responsibility because it affects every individual. We all have personal information that we quite willingly entrust or give away, i.e. credit card details for purchases, Facebook photos, contact information for registrations. **DAY 3** – 15th MAY:

MYTH OF THE DAY:

No harm done; no names were mentioned. Some common perceptions and circumstances:

"But they were happy to share this information with me, therefore I can share it with others," or "But I thought it's public information," or Parish priests have people pass their information to a specific person. Then subsequently that person passes on the information to others without realising that it is disclosure without authority.

The common perception being "They didn't say I couldn't share it."

DAY 4 – 16th MAY:

MYTH OF THE DAY: I have a right to know.

Sometimes there is confusion or a misconception that

Privacy Act and Official Information Act (OIA) requests are the same. We may encounter individuals who wish to request or access personal information or their whole file under the OIA, but what they really mean is a request under the Privacy Act (IPP6 request). Sometimes individuals are also under the impression that organizations are obligated to provide info under the OIA without realising that OIA only applies to government agencies. Meanwhile, the Privacy Act applies to both private and public entities.

There may also be encounters for request for baptism information, or genealogy inquiries or for adoption information, either from extended family members or the general public. For example, grandparents, ex-partners etc, or parents wanting their adult children's personal information like their baptism certificates. When this request is declined, often the pushbacks are "But I'm their parent/grandparent, surely you can give it to me."

having a right to know. Personal information must be lawfully disclosed and accessed, otherwise it is a breach of an individual's privacy rights.

(Information Privacy Principle 6)

CONCLUSION: DAY 5 - 17th MAY: **MYTH OF THE DAY:**

Privacy, confidentiality, and security, they're all the same thing.

One of the most common misconceptions about privacy and confidentiality training is that these terms are interchangeable. However, they have different meanings and implications.

Debunked: Privacy refers to the right of individuals to control who can access and use their personal information, such as their medical records, test results, or diagnoses. Confidentiality refers to the duty of professionals to protect the privacy of their clients or patients and not disclose their information without their consent or legal authorization.

Security refers to the systems employed to ensure personal information and data is kept secure from unlawful access.

Training for each category will differ, it teaches you how to respect these rights and duties and avoid violating them. Some people may think that privacy, confidentiality, and cybersecurity training is a one-time thing that they can complete once and forget about. However, this is a mistake. Training, like any professional development, is an ongoing process that requires regular updates and refreshers. This is because the laws and regulations that govern privacy and confidentiality may change over time, as well as the technologies and practices that affect how information is collected, stored, shared, or deleted. Privacy and confidentiality training helps you stay informed and compliant with the current standards and expectations in your field.
