

ACTIVITIES TO DO AT HOME

1. FAMILY CUBE

This first activity helps us think about how important it is to be part of a family and to be proud of who we are. It helps us realise that it doesn't matter what age we are, we don't always make the right choices.

WHAT TO DO:

Cut out the cube.

On the middle face, either draw a picture or glue a photo of your family.

On one of the faces of the cube - ask your parent or another adult to write about a special memory they have of you.

On another face of the cube - ask them to write about how or why they chose your name

On a third face of the cube write - ask them to write about something they have done which they are sorry about.

Then - you write on another face about a special memory you have of your family

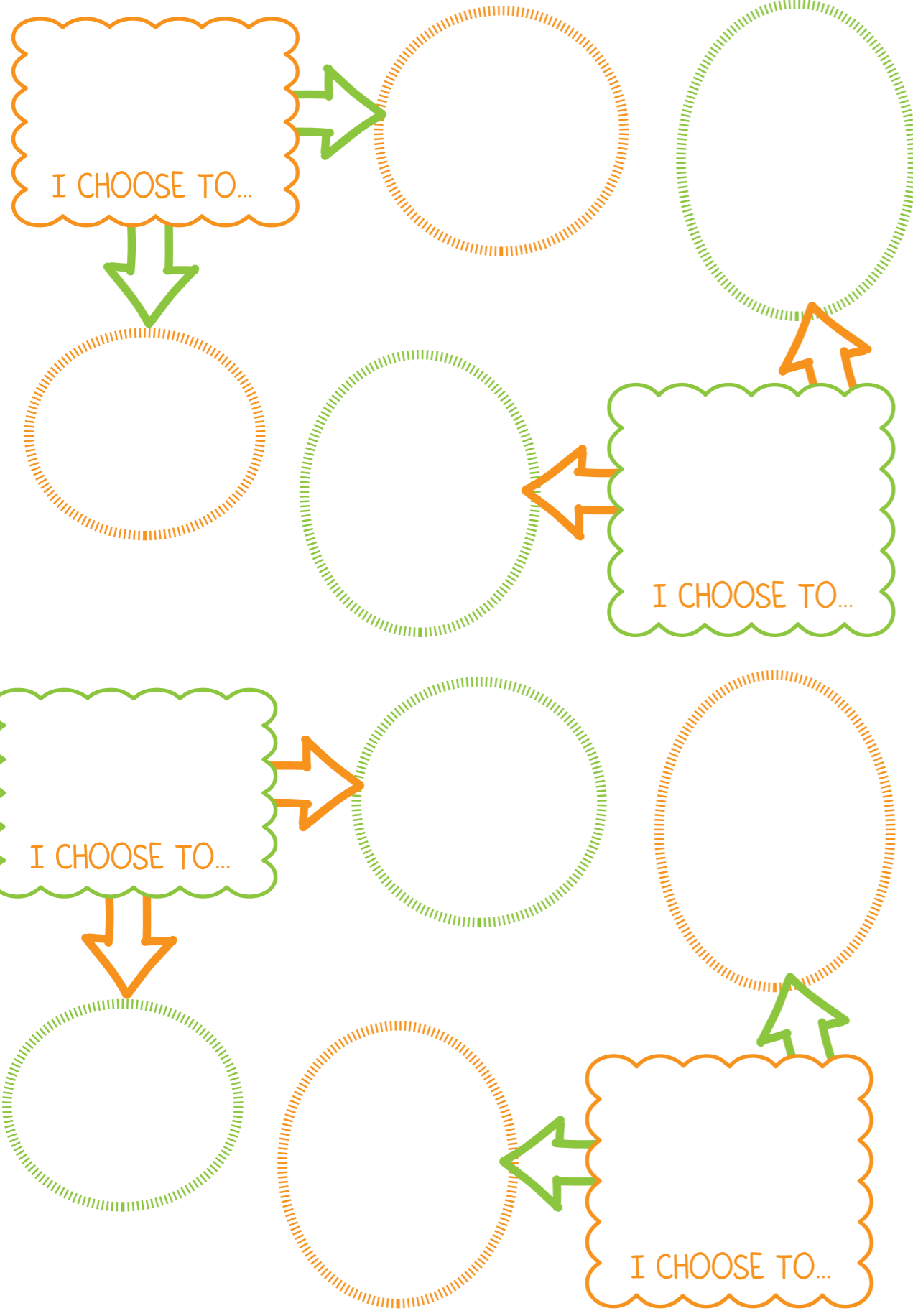
And on the last face of the cube write about something you have done that you are sorry about.

Then - colour and decorate, fold and glue your three- dimensional cube.

And - with your parent or another adult -

Take turns to roll the cube and read what it says -and talk some more about that.

When the picture of the family comes up, talk about what you like about being part of your family/ culture.



2. SHINING LIGHT

This activity reminds us that sometimes we all see things differently. The way we see something might not be right. Sometimes we have to think about how we are 'seeing' (interpreting) something - and maybe act differently.

WHAT TO DO:

With your parent or another adult go outside when it is dark, walk around your house and see if you can name everything even though you can't see it clearly. (Perhaps someone could place some objects outside that you wouldn't expect to see there!)

Now using the torch, shine it on what you thought you saw and see if you were right.

Next shine your torch around and see how many more things you can see that you couldn't see before you used the torch.

READ THIS TOGETHER -

The torch helps us to see things that are there, but we miss because it is dark.

Jesus healed blind people. Sometimes their eyes were blind, sometimes their thoughts were blind. They didn't see (think about) God or about others in the right way.

Jesus knew that if we saw things differently, then we would act differently.

Can you think of a time when, if you had thought differently, you would have acted differently?

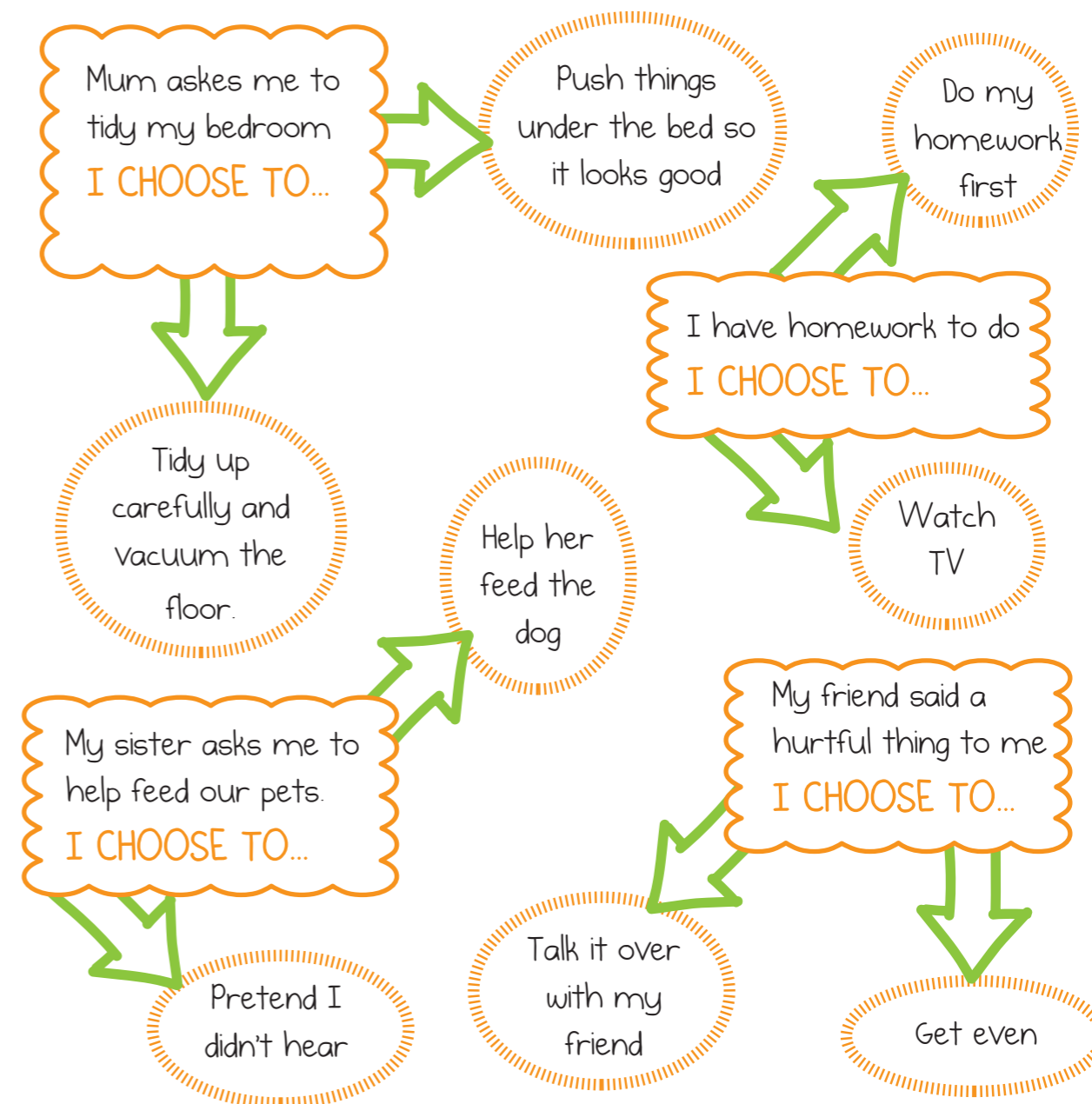
3. GOOD CHOICES
